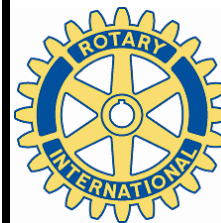

Charles H. and Hazel Dickmann Youth Community Service Awards

Trevor Junga, Hillary Duncan and Andrew Prieshoff were recipients of the 2007 Charles and Hazel Dickmann Youth Community Service Awards. Each student received a \$1000 scholarship, along with \$1000 to present to a charity of their choice.

Trevor Junga is a senior at Pendleton and plans to attend Ball State University to study music technology and music education. He has been involved in winter percussion, band, theatre, National Honor Society and Ovid Community Church. To earn the Eagle Rank in Boy Scouts, Junga helped design, raise money for, and build a baseball diamond in conjunction with Wilson Boys & Girls Club. After presenting

a \$1000 check to Rodney Nichols of the Boys & Girls Club, Nichols stated that Junga has "time, talent and treasure—this man has given all three."

Hillary Duncan is a senior at Anderson High School. She plans to attend Purdue University to study environmental science. She has been involved in soccer, student council, wind ensemble, National Honor Society, Interact, band and St. Ambrose youth. Duncan presented \$1000 to the Madison County Humane Society. Representing the organization, Richard Chandler stated, "Hillary gives animals the extra TLC they need. Our volunteers learn the value of treating people and animals

with respect."

Andrew Prieshoff is a senior at Anderson High School. He plans to attend Mississippi State University to study political science. He has been involved in track, cross country and tennis. He does all these activities while coping with asthma and diabetes. Because of this, Prieshoff is actively involved with the Juvenile Diabetes Research Association, raising \$5300 in "Andy's 600-mile run for diabetes." This organization will benefit from the \$1000 award. "Through his efforts, Andy has helped himself while helping others," said representative Sarah Noel. "The money he has raised will help us get much closer to a cure."

Rotary Moment No. 518, Clubs for Rotarians who only speak English: Charles Shumate

Those Rotarians who make up missed meetings in the US and overseas almost always find the experience worthwhile in many different ways. A visit to an overseas Rotary club has something in common with all travel abroad. Those who expect everything to be like it is at home should stay at home. Those who can appreciate differences should travel. They will enjoy it.

You can expect to feel the difference most if you visit a club in a non English-speaking country. Even then, however, there will almost always be a member who does speak English and will be glad to translate for you. Should that idea not appeal to you, there is still another choice.

You and your travel agent can work together to arrange a schedule for you so that you can make up Rotary at overseas English-speaking clubs. You can begin by going to Munich, Germany, where you will not only

find that the current president of the Munich International Club is a woman, Raphaela Stricker, but that the club meetings are conducted in English. Of course, for those of you who are more comfortable in another tongue, that is possible, too. Members of Rotary Club Munich International are fluent in at least one of the following languages in addition to English: Afrikaans, Dutch, French, German, Greek, Hebrew, Icelandic, Italian, Japanese, Portuguese, Russian, Spanish, and Turkish. That enough for you?

Of course, you will want to travel beyond Munich and you can do that, not only at Kelsterbach Rein-Main but at other European clubs. There are meetings conducted in English in Waterloo, Belgium; Bratislava and Prague, Czech Republic; Copenhagen, Helsinki, Amsterdam, The Hague, Riga, Latvia; Stavanger, Norway; three in Poland; in Moscow and St. Petersburg; Portugal,

Sweden, Switzerland. Beyond Europe there is one English-speaking club in Alexandria and two in Cairo including a breakfast club. There is one in Jakarta and one in Bali as well as one in Taipei. Some months ago we reported on the assistance provided by Rotary clubs in Cyprus to refugees from the fighting in Lebanon. One of those clubs was the Rotary Club of Limassol Berengaria, a club that conducts meetings in English.

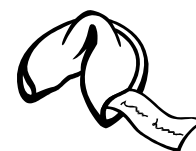
There are also very few clubs in the U.S. that do not use English. One is a branch of the New York City Rotary club that meets with German as its language and a club on Long island that conducts its meetings in Korean.

Oh, yes, you may leave your Spanish at home when you visit the Lima, Peru Sunrise club. English is used there.
